





Barkley Peschel, Vice President of Development, Greater Fort Bend Economic Development Council is excited to be working with The Hill on their first revitalization project. Their program, Fort Bend CORPS (Community Revitalization Projects) is a new 501(c)(3), non profit organization that focuses on emergency home repairs for elderly, disabled and low income homeowners who are financially and physically unable to make needed repairs. Applicants must own and reside in the home and are qualified by a home visit and signed application. This project will be just like our previous "Neighborhood Days", no project is too big or too small for the CORPS!

Fort Bend CORPS is at it again

This past Saturday eight crews of 120 volunteers who are part of the Fort Bend CORPS (community revitalization projects) began repairing, repainting and rebuilding three houses in the Rosenberg-Richmond area.

It was the second time the Fort Bend CORPS has mobilized to help elderly and/or disabled homeowners in Fort Bend at no cost to the homeowner.

Crew members brought their tools paint brushes, ladders, scrapers, gloves, screws, screw drivers, nails, hammers and area organizations donated money to the CORPS to buy paint and lumber.

A caved in porch on one home was rebuilt while other volunteers tackled the home's wooden siding. Peeling paint was scraped off, new wood replaced rotted wood and paint was applied.

Barkley Peschel, Greater Fort Bend Economic Development Council vice president of development, said the CORPS will rehabilitate more privately owned homes on April 8 and also this month will help members of Keep Sugar Land Beautiful and Friends of Old Sugar Land rehabilitate some houses.

"They've been doing this for a couple of years. We want to have the flexibility to do houses at any time, so we're

showing our flexibility now by helping these two organizations with their program," Peschel said.

This past October, the CORPS had 250 volunteers who worked on houses in the county's Fifth Street area. "We have a few of the repeaters," Peschel said, "but it takes a good year to get volunteer crews for every April and October weekends.

"Some people couldn't commit to April but have already committed to October.

What we're lacking now is the more experienced crews" - people who are trained carpenters, plumbers, electricians, landscapers, etc.

Peschel said he has submitted a grant application to the county for a Community Development Block Grant "that would enable us to start our interior and roofing repairs where we actually hire contractors to go in and make the repairs."

Right now, he said the non-profit CORPS is looking for office space "where we can have warehouse space also."

Anyone who wants to volunteer their time and efforts and anyone or organization that wants to donate money for materials needed to rehabilitate homes in Fort Bend can call Peschel at 281-242-1721.

'Hearts and Hammers' to focus on emergency home repairs for elderly

Three organizations are working together to repair senior citizens' homes in The Hill, Sugar Land's oldest community. Keep Sugar Land Beautiful, Fort Bend CORPS, and Friends of Old Sugar Land will answer senior citizens "wish list" of repairs for Neighborhood Day 2000. On April 29, crews will be armed with hammers, paint brushes, and most of all a lot of heart.

Homes in The Hill date back to the early 1900s, many senior citizen residents purchased the homes from Imperial Sugar in the 1950's. Most residents are physically and financially unable to make the repairs themselves

Fort Bend CORPS (Community Revitalization Projects) "Hearts and Hammers" is a new 501(c) (3), non profit organization that focuses on emergency home repairs for elderly, disabled and low income homeowners. The organization was formerly established by the Greater Fort Bend Economic Development Council in January 2000 to meet the demand for emergency home repairs and community revitalization needs throughout Fort Bend County.

Keep Sugar Land Beautiful is also a non profit 501 (c) (3) organization and affiliate of Keep Texas Beautiful and Keep America Beautiful.

Executive Director of KSLB, Melissa Hoffman, states "our mission is to enhance our community by providing beautification and environmental projects and educating the residents of Sugar Land. We look forward to working with our community partners to help keep Sugar Land Beautiful!"

Friends of Old Sugar Land was created in 1991 for residents of The Hill and has held annual Neighborhood Days since 1995. In the past more than 150 volunteers, including Sugar Land Police Department and Sugar Land Fire Department have repaired, painted, and added safety features to thirty senior citizens' homes. In 1997. Neighborhood Days raised more than \$23,000 for Brandon Reves, a five year old Hill resident with cancer of the spine and brain. Lakeview Auditorium's "May Fest on the Hill" was the focus of Neighborhood Day 1998, with volunteers building game booths, and manning booths.

In addition to these organizations many others in the community will be sponsoring or volunteering. K2 Realty will be donating plants for the homes receiving repairs, cash sponsors include Lowe's Home Improvement, Fluor Daniel, Nalco/Exxon, ECO Resources, Alltel. Three locations of McDonalds; New Territory, Eldridge Road and First Colony will be providing lunch for the volunteers for all three Keep Sugar Land Beautiful events. Kroger on Settlers Way/Highway 6 is donating drinks for all events.

Immediately following Neighborhood Day 2000, a special bar-b-q by Vasos Bar-B-Q is planned for all the volunteers and in honor of retiring Council Member, Mary Von Tungeln. "We love to help this type of community project. We have a great clientele in Sugar Land, and any time we can give back to the community we try to do so," says Frank Vasos, owner/operator, Vasos Bar-B-Que.


Hearts & Hammers' Neighborhood Day







More than 75 volunteers young and old helped repair, paint and clean 14 homes in "The Hill," the oldest neighborhood in Sugar Land, during the recent "Hearts and Hammers" Neighborhood Day. The homes, date back to the early 1900s, are occupied by senior citizens who are now financially or physically unable to make repairs on their homes. Area companies donate most of the materials, and individual and group volunteers donate the time and labor. In the top left picture, students from Kempner High School AVID College Program paint the trims on a home. 



On Saturday, April 29 more than 75 volunteers repaired, painted, and cleaned 14 in the oldest neighborhood in Sugar Land, The Hill. Homes in the Hill date back to the early 1900's, many senior citizen residents purchased their home from Imperial Sugar in the 1950's. Some are now financially or physically unable to make repairs on their homes.

All 14 project homes are owner occupied by senior citizens, who have lived in the Hill for more than 45 years. Neighborhood Day Crew Leaders boasted builders and remodelers well known throughout the Sugar Land area; Roland Younger, Leo Meerman, Gene Ponzick, Don Paker, Warren Parker, and Bob Pierce directed volunteers from First Baptist Church, Kempner High School AVID Program, Kiwanis Club, and residents of the Hill. Landscape crews lead by Ricky and Amy Reilly, Susan Burgin and Dan Hohnbaum edged, mowed, trimmed trees and planted flowers donated by Mel and Loretta Knesek, broker/owners of K2 Realty.

Three organizations worked together on the fifth annual Neighborhood Day, Keep Sugar Land Beautiful, Fort Bend CORPS and Friends of Old Sugar Land organized volunteers, supplies and communicated with the elderly homeowners. "We had a wonderful volunteer turnout, the people working

on these homes were of all ages, from all walks of life, with one common bond, a big heart. They all worked so hard to get the job done," says Melissa Hoffman, Executive Director, Keep Sugar Land Beautiful.

A "roast and toast to Princess Mary" for retiring Council Member Mary Von Tungeln took center stage, with Von Tungeln being draped with a trash bag, crown and Princess sash, and several roasts, but most of all heartfelt thanks for all of her years of service to the community. She started as the original Lady Landfill and as a member of the Sugar Land Recycling Board. Von Tungeln has been a city council member for five years, and was coined "Princess Mary" by newspaper columnist/radio personality, Jon Matthews,

Friends of Old Sugar Land founder, Kristin Lytle commented the community involvement seems to get stronger every year. "This is our fifth Neighborhood Day, and I already have volunteers and sponsors approaching me about doing this again in the fall. We also have other older homes in neighboring communities, Mayfield Park and Brookside that are in need of assistance. As long as people find it in their hearts to give eight hours of sweat once or twice a year we'll keep going, and in Sugar Land I know that will never be a problem," says Lytle.
