



#### Sixth Annual Neighborhood Day

lmost 100 volunteers, most of whom were students, worked on senior citizens homes and First Baptist Hispanic Mission located in the first community of Sugar Land, known as "the Hill." Keep Sugar Land Beautiful, Friends of Old Sugar Land and Fort Bend CORPS worked in partnership for a second year to organize the sixth annual event.

Volunteers worked on eight senior citizens' homes with projects ranging from interior cleaning to completely painting a home. Also recognizing that one of the oldest churches in the area needed painting the group decided to assist First Baptist Hispanic Mission. Kempner PALS, Kempner AVID, First Baptist Youth, and Clements students began work early Saturday morning on all projects under





In the area of litter prevention, KSLB organized local volunteers for the annual Don't Mess with Texas Trash-Off and Oyster Creek Clean-up. With more than half of the volunteers being students, how appropriate it was that April 21 was National Youth Service Day. According to a recent Parade magazine article, Steve Culbertson, president and CEO of Youth Service America, which organizes National Youth Service Day, believes that every young person, as early as 5, has the capacity to give back to someone else. "Service is the fundamental way of knowing how you fit into society," says Culbertson.


Kristin Lytle, founder of Friends of Old Sugar Land (which is celebrating its 10th year), assists in organizing year-round community service projects for Kempner AVID and PALS students. Lytle believes not only do the seniors citizens benefit from the high school students but even more the students learn so much from time spent with them. "Many students communicated to me at the end of the day that they enjoyed the work, but even more they loved talking with the homeowner. Mary Westlake, Kempner and FBISD District Teacher of the Year, has expressed interest in Kempner PALS possibly 'adopting' our seniors next year to build on these relationships," says Lytle.

The CORPS manages three programs to deliver repairs: Hearts and Hammers-exterior restoration and painting: Roofs over Fort Bend-roof repair or replacement and Interior Repair Program-repairs to essential interior living systems. One of the homes in the Hill is currently qualifying through the Roofs over Fort Bend program for a new roof. The home, built in the early 1900s, still has the original tin roof which has now rusted beyond repair, to the extent of causing leaks in the home. Fort Bend CORPS is helping neighborhoods improve the quality of life one home at a time with Hearts and Hammers held twice a year in April and October.
