> RE. Preservation of Sugar Land's Oldest Public Building Support of "May Fest On The Hill"

Dear Business Leader and Friend:

The Sugar Land Heritage Society is pleased to sponsor, "May Fest On The Hill: A Good Old Fashioned Festival," a community event to help raise funds for the restoration and preservation of Sugar Land's oldest public building, the Lakeview Auditorium on Lakeview Drive. The building is anticipated to be restored as closely as possible to its original structure. When finished in 1918, the building was the focal point of the community. Some of the many memorable events held at the facility included: a community gathering to send off Sugar Land's soldiers in World War I, a program honoring a football hero whose records have never been broken, numerous civic and social events, rooftop dances, and silent movie presentations.

Through this project we hope to again make this historical landmark a centerpiece for the Sugar Land community and surrounding areas. Many original features of the sturdy building still survive including the stage area, foot lighting, and a sliding screen used to show the silent movies. A custodian's apartment also still remains on the second level, which may one day become a museum. The Fort Bend Symphony and a local theater group have already expressed their intent to use the 500-seat facility on a regular basis, upon restoration and the addition of much needed air-conditioning.

Co-Chair Lakeview Auditorium Restoration Project--1998

LAKEVIEW HISTORICAL DATA

Lakeview Elementary is a cluster of buildings with a history that spans the last seventy five years. Our school encompasses nearly six acres and is nestled on the edge of Cleveland Lake. We are also located near the hub of the older part of Sugar Land.

The auditorium was constructed in 1917. It is one of the oldest public buildings in the east end of Fort Bend County and is the oldest building in the Fort Bend Independent School District. The auditorium was once used as a community theater and later as a movie theater. On the east side of the auditorium is a narrow steel stairway leading to the second story, once living quarters for the school custodian. The auditorium is still used for play and choir productions, as well as PTA meetings. It was dedicated in 1992 as a Texas Historical building.

When classes began near the early part of the century, a circular drive brought school buses to the front of the auditorium to drop off students, who then proceeded to their single-room class buildings, located in a semicircle around the auditorium.

A gymnasium was added to the campus in the 1930's which included an indoor swimming pool. The pool was later covered over and used as a storage area.

Lakeview housed Sugar Land High School and Sugar Land Elementary and was the only school before Missouri City, Stafford and Sugar Land consolidated in 1959 to form the Fort Bend Independent School District.

Today, there are three classroom wings and two duplex buildings in addition to the auditorium, cafeteria and gymnasium. The primary wing houses first and second grade classes. The intermediate wing houses grades three and four, the art and music rooms, the library and the main office suites.

Recent construction and renovation have added seven new classrooms to our third wing. Three kindergarten classrooms and four fifth grade classrooms are housed in the new wing. In addition, a new enclosed air conditioned corridor will be used to move students from the main building to the cafeteria.

been postponed. Hopefully, he will be well enough by May 9th to be CoGrand Marshal of the Parade.






